# California ranks second greatest productivity growth in U.S. since 2012

New research has revealed the American states which have had the largest increases in productivity since 2012, with California recording the second highest improvement by 27.03%.

The research, conducted by digital adoption magazine digital-adoption.com, analyzed ten years of annual labor productivity data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) to establish the U.S. states which improved in labor productivity the most from 2012 (private non-farm sector).

The analysis revealed that California had the second largest increase, where productivity improved by 27.03%, in line with the same increase for output per worker, which went up by 27.87% over the ten year period. Labor compensation also grew from \$986 billion to \$1.68 trillion between 2012 and 2021. That's a 71.24% increase compared to 2012, the fifth highest increase of its type in the U.S. over the last ten years.

Washington improved the most compared to any other state, with a 30.31% increase in productivity from 2012. This is due to increased

# **Building Relationships: One Construction Project at a Time**

Strong relationships between general contractors and subcontractors are an important component of a successful project. These relationships don't mature overnight, and it takes time and effort from both parties to build a level of trust that evolves into a strong working partnership. Putting in the work to build these relationships can be mutually beneficial to both parties and pay off for years to come. So, how do relationships between and subcontractor and a general contractor start? Sometimes a general contractor needs additional bid coverage for a project or is expanding into new areas. A subcontractor might be looking to break into doing larger projects or branch out into other sectors of the industry.

Regardless the how or why, they usually begin with a single project, a single bid. Here are some tips for both general contractors and subcontractors to follow to build strong relationships through every step of a project from

#### **During the Bid Process**

### Subcontractors

If you're bidding to a general contractor for the first time this is your opportunity to make a strong first impression. In addition to a competitive bid, you need to prove that your company is the best choice to perform the work. This means putting together a proposal highlighting your company's level of experience, expertise, knowledge base, and capacity to perform the work.

A strong portfolio of past projects, sound financial footing, and stellar safety record are great ways to make your company stand out from the competition. Be sure to ask any questions if you are unclear on the scope or scale of the project and always attend any pre-bid meeting the general contractor holds.

### **General Contractors**

When bidding out projects, make sure your invitations to bid (ITBs) are easy to understand and provide as much information and documents necessary for subs to submit a bid. Make sure the scope of work for each trade is clearly defined to avoid subs bidding on work that they assume might be part of their bid.

Communicate any due dates or prequalification requests as far in advance as possible to give trade contractors ample time to ask questions and compile all the necessary information and documentation. Hold a pre-bid meeting or site visit to and answer any questions that subs might have. Be responsive and timely when a sub reaches out for more information on a bid and make sure any plan revisions or addenda gets distributed to all your bidders.

#### After Bids Are Awarded

#### **Subcontractors**

If you're awarded a contract, you need to meet with the general contractor to discuss the project schedule, key milestones, logistics, safety plan, and payment schedules. Review the contract and ask to make any changes to any unnecessarily unfavorable conditions or clauses in the contract.

# Governor Newsom Names Antonio Villaraigosa Infrastructure Advisor to Leverage Federal Dollars in Building California Infrastructure for the Next Century

Moving to harness a once-in-a-generation investment under the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), Governor Gavin Newsom today named former Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa to serve as an Infrastructure Advisor to the State of California, working with local, state and federal leaders to identify priority projects and maximize access to federal funding across all regions of the state.

The Governor's announcement comes as the U.S. Department of Transportation today outlined \$120 million in funding that California will receive for eight projects through the IIJA Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant program to improve and modernize transportation infrastructure.

"With this influx of federal dollars, we have an incredible opportunity to rebuild California while creating quality jobs, modernizing crucial infrastructure, and accelerating our clean transportation progress, benefiting communities up and down the state," said Governor Newsom. "Antonio has the extensive experience and relationships to deliver on this promise and bring together the many partners who will be key to our success. I look forward to his collaboration with the Administration as we build up communities across California."

Known for his skill at building broad bi-partisan coalitions, Villaraigosa will serve as the key state liaison for local elected officials on infrastructure needs, conducting meetings with regional leaders and with federal leaders in Washington, D.C., in coordination with the Governor's Office. Villaraigosa will not be a state employee. This position is supported through a partnership with California Forward, which will collaborate with him and members of the Administration on local engagement efforts.

In 2013, Villaraigosa finished his two terms as Mayor of Los Angeles, after eight years of major strides in transportation, crime reduction, infrastructure, energy and resource sustainability, right-sizing government, business development and education reform. Prior to his election as Mayor, Villaraigosa served as a member of the Los Angeles City Council from 2003 to 2005. From 1994 through 2000, Villaraigosa served • in the California State Assembly as Democratic Whip, Majority Leader and Speaker of the Assembly. He was a member of President Obama's Transition Economic Advisory Board, the 2012 Chairman of the Democratic National Convention and President of the U.S. Conference of Mayors. Villaraigosa was a Fellow at Harvard University and a Professor in public policy at the University of Southern California. He was a Senior Fellow at the Bipartisan Policy Institute in Washington, D.C. Additionally, he has served on the McGraw Hill Global Education Board of Directors, and currently serves as Board Chair of The Change Company. He also serves on various boards, including at UC Merced, AltaMed and Peace Over Violence. Villaraigosa is currently a Partner and Co-Chair at Actum, where he focuses on strategic and crisis communication consulting to senior executives in large public and private sector organizations.

- \$5 million to the Sacramento Area Council of Governments to plan and design Mobility Zones in the Sacramento Region
- \$1.6 million to the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation for a separated pedestrian and bicycle path across Highway 101 in Del Norte County

# **Building Relationships: One Construction Project at a Time**

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If you weren't awarded a contract, ask the general contractor for a meeting to go over why you didn't win. Regardless of whether it was an uncompetitive bid, lack of experience, or failure to provide required documents or prequalification forms, you should try and find out what you could do better to improve your chances on your next bid.

### **General Contractors**

Meet with all your awarded subcontractors for an in-depth review of the upcoming project. Leverage their knowledge and expertise as you develop the construction schedule and project timeline. Lay out expectations for safety meetings, daily reporting, and how and when information is to be communicated. Make it clear that any issues or complications should be brought to you immediately so both parties can work to resolve them as quickly as possible and keep the project on track. Make yourself available to any subcontractor you didn't award a contract to so you can explain why they didn't win. Providing transparent and honest feedback to a subcontractor, especially one bidding to you for the first time, will help them submit a better proposal next time. It's also a good time to build rapport with subs you haven't worked with to ensure they will bid on future opportunities you send their way.

#### **During Construction**

#### Subcontractors

Show up to the jobsite every day with the tools, equipment, materials, and workers you need to get that day's work done. Make sure your workers act and perform their duties safely and professionally. Practice good housekeeping and clean up after every workday, picking up tools and equipment and disposing of any construction waste as you go.

Keep in contact with the site supervisor and project manager with updates on your progress and advise them immediately of any issues or potential delays that might impact other subcontractors on the job or the overall project timeline.

#### **General Contractors**

Communication is key to every successful construction project. Check in on all your subcontractors throughout the project and be available to discuss how the work is progressing and monitor their performance. If you're keeping your subs in the loop on any potential changes to the schedule or scope of work, it's easier to work together to develop a solution rather than expecting them to be able to just go with the flow.

When issues arise, and they will, be professional and respectful of the other person's opinions and suggestions. When something goes wrong on a project it's easier to resolve the problem if everyone can work things out with a rational and respectful discussion rather than simply pointing fingers and laying blame. It's easy for tempers to flare when things aren't going right so it's always best to let cooler heads prevail. **Project Completion** 

After the completion of each project, general contractors and subs should get together to do a postmortem. Items to discuss should include what worked, what didn't, what issues arose and how they were handled, and how they might handle them in the future. This should be an open and frank conversation to work through any disagreements and difficulties so that these items can be addressed and corrected before the next project.

Once a project has been completed successfully and both parties are satisfied with the outcome it's just a matter of rinse, wash, and repeat. As time goes on, and more successful projects are completed between a general contractor and a sub, that level of trust and mutual respect will strengthen and grow into a strong relationship and partnership that both parties will benefit from for many years.

# California ranks second greatest productivity growth in U.S. since 2012

output per worker, which is currently 29.7% higher than 2012, and is the largest output per worker improvement than any other state in the study. The largest increase in Washington's productivity was seen in 2021, where productivity levels leapt by 6.4% as businesses navigated the pandemic. Hourly compensation had also risen by 9.2%, up from \$55.71 dollars per hour worked in 2020 to \$60.82 in 2021. Value-added output also rose by 11.9%. Workers in Washington have received the third highest increases in labor compensation in the U.S., growing from a total of \$171.28 billion in 2012 to \$307.47 billion in 2021, a 79.5% increase in ten vears.

Kansas is third with a 19.85% productivity increase from 2012. Output per worker has also increased by 17.24%. Despite this, employment is only slightly above that seen in 2012, and hours worked have dropped by 1.79% ten years later. Hourly compensation has increased furthest compared to any other measurement for Kansas, rising from \$31.27 dollars per hour worked in 2012 to \$42.67 in 2021, an increase of 36.43%. During the pandemic, labor productivity rose by 3.7% in 2020, despite a -5.9% drop in hours worked, -5.1% drop in employment and -1.3% drop in value-added output. In the same year, labor compensation rose by 1.4%.

Colorado labor productivity has improved by 18.74% since the beginning of the study, placing the state in fourth. Labor compensation has also risen by 67.56% since 2012, from \$132.16 billion to \$221.46 billion, the sixth highest compensation increase recorded. Output per worker and hours worked are currently 13.37% and 14.6% higher than 2012, respectively. That's an extra 424,000 jobs, with BLS figures showing 2.11 million jobs in 2012 to 2.54 million in 2021.

New Hampshire ranks fifth with an 18.39% worker productivity increase since 2012. During this time period, labor compensation has risen by 54.36%, from \$35.37 billion to \$54.6 billion, and output per worker has grown by 19.39%. Value-added output has risen 47.9% from \$54.16 billion to \$80.12 billion. Hours worked and employment levels have grown the least, 5.48% and 4.59%, respectively. That's an increase from 960 million hours worked to 1.01 billion, and employment growth of 599,400 to 626,900 jobs from 2012 to 2021.

The top ten states have increased worker compensation, output per worker, real value-added output despite higher labor costs, varying levels of employment and hours worked. The western U.S. region saw the largest increase in productivity overall compared to other regions. Productivity increased by 21.47%, in line with increased output per worker. Five of the top ten states also experienced the highest growth in value-added output: Washington, California, Colorado, Utah and Oregon. In ten years, total U.S. employment has grown from 243.95 million jobs in 2012 to 268.53 million in 2021.

North Dakota is not far behind New Hampshire in sixth place, with an 18.28% boost to productivity levels since 2012. However, unlike New Hampshire, employment levels and hours worked in North Dakota have declined since 2012, by 6.13% and 8.25%, respectively. That's a drop from 376,600 to 353,500 jobs and 641 million to 588 million hours worked from 2012 to 2021. Over ten years, labor compensation has risen from \$21.04 billion to \$24.94 billion, an 18.57% increase, and has risen in line with productivity every year, except for 2015. For the years where labor compensation had dropped, so too did value-added output and output per worker.

Massachusetts' productivity increased by 17.25% since 2012, placing the state seventh most improved. Total labor compensation has increased by 48.3%, from \$234.55 billion to \$347.84 billion, with a 6% increase in hours worked and a 4.37% increase in employment. Employment has grown from 3.15 million jobs in 2012 to 3.28 million in 2021. Labor productivity grew throughout the pandemic, a 5.4% increase, despite a 9.7% drop in employment, during 2020. During 2020, productivity increased due to higher output levels per worker, which went up by 6.4%, potentially due to the 6.7% increase in hourly compensation for the same period.

Utah is eighth with 16.95% increased productivity levels from 2012. Labor compensation has risen by 82.57% since 2012, the second highest increase in ten years out of any other state, behind Idaho. Utah experienced the highest growth in value-added output, increasing by 77% from \$102.4 billion to \$181.24 billion over ten years. Productivity continued to grow throughout the pandemic; during 2020, labor compensation increased by 5.1%, and output per worker increased by 2.3%, while employment dropped by 2.3%. Employment has recovered in 2021, growing by 5.5% compared to the year prior, which saw employment jump from 1.36 million to 1.44 million in one year.

In ninth place is Nebraska, which closely follows behind Utah, as labor productivity was raised by 16.86% over ten years. Since 2012, labor compensation grew 43.66%, and valueadded output was also raised by 46%, going from \$76.76 billion to \$111.83 billion. Employment and hours worked have only slightly risen, increasing by 3.65% and 1.65% over ten years, respectively.

Oregon ranks tenth on the list due to an increase of 16.75% productivity. Oregon's value-added output has increased by 56%, the eighth highest over ten years when compared to any other state.

Four states saw a decrease in labor productivity ten years on from 2012: Wyoming, Nevada, Delaware and Alaska. For these states, the years in which compensation levels dropped, so did output per worker and value-added output. Alaska's productivity levels have dropped the furthest out of any U.S. state since 2012, which is currently 8.31% lower, ten years later. Output per worker has dropped by 11.21% compared to 2012. Output levels have yet to improve past this threshold, and are currently at their lowest levels in 2021. Alaska is the only state in the U.S. to have recorded a decline in value-added output, reduced by 12.3% from \$45.34 billion to \$39.76 billion over ten years.

Delaware is currently 2.19% below 2012 levels of productivity. The largest productivity drop happened in 2016, which saw an 8.5% decrease compared to the previous year. This can be attributed to an 8.6% increase in unit labor costs, 2.2% real wage compensation drop, 6.8% decrease in real value-added output and 8.4% decrease in output per worker.

Nevada's productivity is currently 1.55% below 2012 levels, and has been below threshold since 2014. Despite this, the state has experienced the eighth largest percentage increase in labor compensation in the study, recovering after the state experienced some of the severest drops to compensation, hours worked, output and employment during the pandemic over 2020. While employment levels have risen from 1.06 million jobs in 2012 to 1.29 million in 2021, output per worker has remained similar to 2012, after experiencing a decline over ten years, and is currently only 0.284% higher ten years later.

Wyoming's productivity has fallen below 2012 levels for the first time since 2015, and is currently 0.409% below levels experienced ten years ago. Hours worked, employment and output per worker have all dropped after 2015, knocked further by the pandemic, and have not fully recovered since. In 2019, there were 239,500 jobs and the figures for 2021 currently show 233,400 jobs, despite there being 240,400 jobs in 2012.

Commenting on the findings, a spokesperson from digital-adoption.com said: "The nature of work has changed greatly over the last ten years, which has been accelerated by the Covid-19 pandemic. This data reveals that the Western U.S. region has improved greater than other areas of the nation. The two states which are most improved, Washington and California, are home to America's largest digital tech hubs. The digital sector has enjoyed a boom in recent years, partially due to the effects of the pandemic increasing the transition towards remote working, which this sector was most prepared for. These states have led the way in digital transformation, and offer a great example for others to follow in how digital adoption can accelerate business growth and productivity."

# **Jacqueline Pruitt: The steel boss of Sankofa Park**

Jacqueline Pruitt, founder, and owner of Marvella Steel Placers (MSP) starts her day at 6 a.m., sitting at a desk in front of the computer in her spacious, yet sparsely decorated office in Signal Hill.

Behind her sits a fish tank where her turtle "Shelley" lives. Behind the tank is a poster visible through the water with Martin Luther King Jr.'s image and the words: "I Have A Dream."

But Pruitt has more than a dream. As one of only a handful of female-owned and Black-owned rebar installation companies, the Long Beach native is a trailblazer as well as a no-nonsense boss.

Marvella, which launched in 2016, has installed rebar (steel bar used to reinforce concrete) on three Purple Line stations and three stations at the Regional Connector Transit Project. The company also worked on the I-15 freeway between the 91 and 10 freeways.

Today, Pruitt's company is providing the rebar to Destination Crenshaw (DC), the 1.3-mile openair art and culture corridor being built along Crenshaw Boulevard. The project includes the landmark Sankofa Park, currently under construction, and for which Pruitt's company already has delivered and installed rebar.

With an average of 20-60 employees working on various transportation systems such as trains and highways, she has to keep her eyes on the ball.

Depending on the size of the project, Pruitt said her smallest contract could be in the neighborhood of \$15,000 and her largest about \$9.6 million.

In the highly competitive construction industry and rebar business, Pruitt has fought for acceptance. Because Destination Crenshaw is special to her, she fought equally hard to win the bid for the history-making project.

"When I started reading about Destination Crenshaw, I said, 'this is my job,' Pruitt said. "I really wanted it because it means something to me. It has meaning. I frequent that area. Leimert Park is special. To build that, yeah, I had to be a part of it. I had to."

Hers is a track record to make any company owner proud, but Pruitt has bested unusually long odds.

When she was younger, she took several wrong turns. She wrestled with drug use and homelessness and was in and out of iail.

That life ended on May 19, 2003.

"I got arrested at one of the places I used to hang out," Pruitt said. "The idea to shoot up drugs was in my mind when the police came. A week prior I had broken down and asked God to help me. Thankfully, my parole officer sent me to treatment instead of jail. It worked."

Since then, Pruitt has been sober.

If not for the courage she mustered to turn her life around, MSP would have never been a dream.

With her commitment, came a business model that has stood her in good stead.

"We perform safely and do high-quality work in the field and in the office," she said. "We are professional; we remain in compliance, have reasonable prices, and we work with our customers and provide certification if their project needs to meet certifications."

Since Marvella Steel Placers opened, the company has completed 22 jobs.

"Not bad for a girl," Pruitt said, smiling.

Now that she's the boss and no longer physically working on construction sites, Pruitt said she misses "getting my hands dirty."

"The last time I got my hands dirty was more than a year ago," she said. "Then Destination Crenshaw started, and I couldn't help but put my tool belt on and tie some bar with the guys. My hands are soft now. But, in case I'm needed, I still have my tool belt."

On this morning, Pruitt is checking for upcoming jobs, greeting some of her workers, taking calls, making deals, and talking to one of her foremen about the progress on a current job - all in the span of five minutes. And, she makes it look easy.

This, she says, is the life she dreamed for herself.

"I love being a Black-owned, woman-owned company," she said. "I also like that it's very physical. When I got into this, I was 29. I had to be smart. It was a great opportunity to grow."

Marvella Steel Placers is named after Pruitt's mother as a way to pay homage to the woman who always showed her unconditional love.

"My mother was my everything," Pruitt said. "Even though I was doing some things she didn't necessarily approve of, she still loved me." Now that Pruitt is gaining success, she'd like to see more women "making their mark in construction."

"Women have a place in construction," she said. "Just look at me. If someone doesn't give you a chance, make a way for yourself. There's a place for everybody. Black women come from Egyptian queens. We can do anything."

Pruitt came by her interest in construction honestly. Her father, now 87, was in construction. She remembers, vividly, him being a hard worker who would leave the house at 4 a.m. to go to work.

"At the time, I didn't know what he did," she said. "I knew he came home dirty and smelled unusual."

Two decades later, her actual leap into construction began quite by accident. One day she ran into a female friend, who is a carpenter working on a large project.

"She was dressed all dirty," said Pruitt, who studied psychology at Long Beach City College and Cal State Fullerton. "I asked her what she did and she told me. I asked how much it paid. She told me, and I said, "Where do I sign up?"

That's when Pruitt applied for a pre-apprenticeship – during which she was taught trades from laying concrete, to plumbing, framing, and, yes, rebar.

"When I got into construction, I had to learn to be assertive," she said. "My foreman told me to grow some balls. I learned how to be assertive and let people know what they have to do. I started as an apprentice, then became a journeyman, then a foreman. I then became a general foreman for the guy that got me into rebar. He planted a seed." In her third year as an apprentice, Pruitt earned the Lead Ironworker position on projects such as Berth 200 in the Port of Los Angeles, the Automated Container Movers in the Port of Long Beach, freeway lane additional bridges, abutments, and miles of retaining walls and barrier rail on the 91 Freeway.

Additionally, she worked slab on metal decks for the famous Wilshire Grand Center high-rise. Shortly after achieving her journeyman status, she earned the foreman position and built the Hollywood Park Casino on time and under budget. From there she began managing three or more jobs simultaneously.

Pruitt has steadily grown into her self-assurance but admits she "had no idea" what owning her own company entailed.

"Well, I didn't know this was an owning- yourown-company type deal," said Pruitt, who brought in her niece, as office manager, to help her run MSP. "All I wanted to do, initially, was to just go grab some guys I worked with and go do a job."

Instead, she ended up going to bidding classes and learning how to look for jobs.

"It took a year and a half to figure it out," she said. "I was told by some people that because I was a Black woman-owned company, I'd be at a disadvantage contract-wise."

Today Pruitt is positioning her Marvella Steel Placers to be the premier rebar installation company signatory to Ironworkers Local 416 holding the following designations: SBE, DBE, WBE, MBE, LBE, CBE and LGBTBE.

Throughout her life, Pruitt said people gave her a chance, so she wants to pay it forward.

"My hope is to continue to be a better me and be in a position to help others," she said. "There is a big piece of pie to be had, but, [more people need to get] to the table to eat it."

# Larry Knowles, Rising Tide Sea Vegetables

Larry Knowles is certainly not the first person to find a use for the bounty of sea vegetables to be found along the Mendocino coast. But Knowles and his company — Rising Tide Sea Vegetables — have developed a unique product niche: healthy treats for humans and other animals. Among their products, Rising Tide sells maple kelp crunch bars that people like to eat and feather boa seaweed that bears, fish, and otters like to flip, nibble or bat around for hours.

In 2008, Knowles and his business manager, Marla Greenway, began receiving consulting services from the Mendocino Small Business Development Center operated by West Company. SBDC consultant Michael Carroll worked with Rising Tide to identify weak and strong products, calculate healthier profit margins, and balance cash flow. The most striking thing Knowles and Greenway learned from this analysis was that one of their most popular products — their Maple Kelp Crunch bars — was being sold at a loss.

The bars were being made by a company on the east coast and then labeled and distributed by Rising Tide. Knowles resolved to find a way to manufacture the bars himself. First, he purchased the assets of a commercial business in Fort Bragg, including a large commercial baking oven. Then, he partnered with a professional

baker to develop his own recipe for the product. After much research and experimentation, they were able to achieve the taste and quality they wanted while keeping costs down to profitable level. "Initially, we thought we might have to discontinue the organic energy bar line," says Greenway. "This wasn't a happy prospect. But now — as a result of our consulting with Michael – we're very excited and optimistic about the future of our snack product line."

As a further consequence of consulting with West/SBDC, Knowles was encouraged to develop an offshoot business: a commercial, shareduse community kitchen known affectionately as "Chubby's." According to Greenway, "The assistance and education we've received from Michael for this new project has been invaluable." And in their not-for-human-consumption line, represented by its Feather Boa product. Otherwise known as Egregia Menziesii, Feather Boa is a seaweed too tough for humans but much loved by bears, fish, and otters, among others. And, like other seaweeds, the Feather Boa is packed with nutrients. Rising Tide has marketed its seaweed to zoos for years as a natural, behavior-enhancing edible toy.

Susan Garrett, from the Lake Superior Zoo, noted that their polar bears, reef fish, and North American river otters all enjoy the Feather Boa. "The seaweed fascinated the polar bears" says Garrett. "Initially, they were not sure what to do with it but soon both bears jumped into the water and grabbed a piece. Bubba remained in the water the whole time and swallowed his down rather quickly. Berlin brought hers up onto a rock and took her time with it, quite obviously relishing the treat."

# California unemployment checks: New report says here's why they're so hard to get

If you get laid off, there's a system that's supposed to help you get by: unemployment benefits. Whenever California stares down a pandemic or a possible recession, the partial wage-replacement program is one of the most important economic safeguards for workers.

But the benefits have become more difficult for workers to access, due to the program's design and decisions made by California's embattled Employment Development Department. That's according to an in-depth report released this morning from the Legislative Analyst's Office, a non-partisan agency that provides advice to the Legislature.

The report found that the benefits program's orientation toward businesses — which fund the benefits and have an incentive to keep costs down — led the department to emphasize hold-ing down costs. Pressure from the federal government to avoid errors led the department to try, however successfully, to minimize fraud.

The result, according to the report: The department pursued lowering costs and hindering fraud over making it easy for workers to access benefits.

"Looked at individually, one of these policies might seem totally reasonable, either to limit fraud or or minimize business costs," said Chas Alamo, the report's author and principle fiscal and policy analyst with the Legislative Analyst's office. "But when you look at them, and kind of step back and look at the suite of policies that have been made over several decades, it becomes clear that there's a sort of imbalance in the system," said Alamo. Gov. Gavin Newsom's press office directed questions about the report to the Employment Development Department, saying it was best suited to talk about the report.

Department spokesperson Gareth Lacy wrote in a statement that EDD "appreciates and will carefully review the LAO's ideas for further simplifying processes and speeding up the delivery of services to Californians. Many of these ideas, such as limiting improper claim denials and minimizing delays, have been incorporated into EDD actions over the past year."

Lacy also pointed to a modernization push at the department to improve call centers, simplify forms and notices, including user testing, developing data analysis tools to continue curbing fraud, and upgrading department training to increase the pace of application processing.

Early in the COVID pandemic as joblessness rates soared, the department struggled to keep up with a surge of benefits claims — leaving some Californians repeatedly calling the department in frustration and waiting weeks or months for the money to arrive.

Then came sensational reports that the department had paid out as much as \$20 billion in fraudulent benefits.

Last December, the department froze 345,000 disability insurance claims due to suspected fraud. As it tried to root out disability benefits fraud, calls to the department with questions surged, and many went unanswered.

Despite an increase in fraud during the pandemic, fraud has historically been uncommon in California's unemployment benefits, likely "representing less than 1 percent of claims," the report found. The vast majority of fraud that occurred during the pandemic was concentrated in The report lays out evidence that unemployment benefits have become too difficult for workers to access.

a temporary federal program that has now ended.

When workers are denied benefits, for example, they're allowed to file appeals. The report found that more than half of denials are overturned on appeal, meaning those workers should have gotten the benefits in the first place. By contrast, "less than one-quarter are overturned in the rest of the country," the report found.

Also slowing the process: extensive, and sometimes confusing, steps to prove eligibility for California unemployment benefits.

The department's actions during the pandemic suggest that getting payments to workers is not its highest priority, the report said. For example, the department disqualified about 1 in 4 unemployment benefits claims during the pandemic for failing to respond to the department's requests for additional information — or because the department was not able to process the additional information provided in the allotted time frame.

Meanwhile, a September 2020 report written by a strike team assembled by Gov. Gavin Newsom found that during the same period, each department field office "had an estimated 450 pounds of unopened mail and had no system for processing unopened mail. Further, at the state's call centers, less than 1 percent of callers reached an EDD staff member."

The Legislative Analyst's Office report also revealed that the Employment Development Department mischaracterized the number of people seeking jobless benefits that it was disqualifying or denying in reports to the Legislature. From the start of the pandemic to June 30, 2021, the department sent weekly dispatches to the Legislature. During that period, the department reported that it had disqualified or denied 705,000 unemployment benefits claims, according to the Legislative Analyst Office's report. But the Legislative Analyst's Office found that the department disqualified at least 3.4 million during that period.

When asked about this discrepancy, the department said it had interpreted the requirement to report to the Legislature to mean the number of people who were found not to qualify under state and federal eligibility rules, and so it did not report the number of people being disqualified by procedural rules.

"People should get fired for this," said Jim Patterson, a Republican state assemblymember from Fresno, citing how the Legislature was misled.

The report corroborated what Patterson already sensed, he said – his office has helped about 3,000 constituents who had problems with the department. Through that process, he added, he saw how confounding the communication from the department to unemployed people sometimes is. "They write to constituents as if they're creating a treatise for a master's degree in confusion," Patterson said.

"We're just seeing the result of a bureaucratic system that wasn't capable of doing its fundamental mission," Patterson said.

# San Francisco Receives \$23 Million Federal Grant for Safer Streets

Mayor London N. Breed and the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) today announced that the U.S. Department of Transportation has allocated \$23 million for safety upgrades along San Francisco's Howard Street through the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) initiative.

"Making the Howard Street corridor safer will save lives and prevent injuries will also encouraging more people to safely use our bike network in the South of Market area," said Mayor London Breed. "We have moved quickly to open protected bike lanes with temporary dividers on Howard Streets, and this will allow us to build on that success and make these changes with more permanent infrastructure. I am thankful for Speaker Nancy Pelosi's support of making our streets safer and her advocacy to Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg this spring to fund the Howard Streetscape Project."

"Yesterday's announcement is a vital step toward ensuring all San Franciscans can safely share our streets – including on foot or on a bicycle," Speaker Pelosi said. "This \$23 million federal investment will help build the safer, greener Howard Street that our City deserves: saving lives, easing commutes, and brining communities closer together. As San Francisco's proud representative in the Congress, it was my privilege to help secure this transformative funding, and I will continue fighting alongside Mayor London Breed to achieve our Vision Zero – ending traffic fatalities in San Francisco by 2024."

Located in the South of Market neighborhood (SoMa), between 11th and 4th streets, the How-

ard Streetscape Project will improve safety on a high-injury corridor, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, support the City's transformative vision for SoMa as a regional hub, and improve mobility for visitors and residents, including low-income populations who depend most upon riding transit, walking, and bicycling. The transformation of this corridor received strong community engagement and support from safety advocates in San Francisco.

"All through COVID we've been experimenting with street safety improvements using plastic and paint," said Jeffrey Tumlin, SFMTA Director of Transportation. "We're grateful for Speaker Pelosi's support to upgrade our successful pilots with concrete and trees."

The funding will transform a three-lane westbound, dangerous, and heavily travelled arterial to a proposed two-lane street with bike infrastructure improvements including a protected two-way bikeway, protected intersections and separate bicycle and vehicle phases, pedestrian infrastructure improvements such as raised crosswalks at alleyways, curb ramps and pedestrian-level lighting, and civic amenity zones that include decorative crosswalks and historic plaques and green infrastructure indicative of a safe street design built to protect the most vulnerable road users.

Between 2014 and 2019, three fatalities occurred on the corridor, along with 152 traffic crashes on the Folsom-Howard couplet, with more than half of these involving people walking or biking.

# Using Job Hazard Analysis to Improve Construction Safety

Construction sites can be a dangerous work environment. Safety managers and project managers are tasked with identifying and eliminating hazards to ensure the safety of everyone on the jobsite. Conducting a job hazard analysis for each job on a project is an effective method for mitigating potential hazards and protecting workers.

A job hazard analysis is a process used to identify and eliminate or mitigate potential hazards. The process involves breaking down the job into individual tasks, identifying potential hazards for each task, risk assessment to determine the likelihood and severity of each hazard, and developing preventative measures aimed at eliminating each hazard.

### **Getting Started**

The first step is to determine which jobs you want to create a job hazard analysis for and prioritize which ones you will tackle first. You might want to start with jobs that have a high rate of accident occurrence at your company or jobs that have the most potential for causing serious injuries or death. Jobs with low accident rates or potential for serious injuries should go to the bottom of your list.

New jobs and jobs that are performed infrequently should be prioritized accordingly since it's likely your workers won't have as much experience performing those tasks. They might not be as familiar with the necessary safety measures compared to jobs they perform on a regular basis.

Eventually, you will create a library of job hazard analyses on all the jobs your workers perform. Periodically, these will need to be updated and altered when the environment or site conditions change or if the sequence of steps to perform a job is modified or changed.

### Break the Job Down Into Individual Tasks

Once you've decided on which jobs to focus on first, it's time to break down each job into individual sequential tasks. The best way to do this is by having a supervisor or safety manager observe an experienced worker perform the job. The observer should take detailed notes of each step, focusing on what is being done rather than how the worker is performing each task.

Taking a video recording of the worker performing the job can be helpful in ensuring you haven't missed a step in the process or gotten any of the steps out of the order they were performed. The video can also be used to review the steps and verify their accuracy, and provide a visual aid for your team to identify potential hazards.

When sequencing out steps in a job be sure to start each step with an action verb like "lift" or "cut" in order to focus on what is being done. Try to keep the number of steps or tasks in each job to 10 or fewer. If 10 or more steps are needed for a particular job, it might be a good idea to separate the job into two separate jobs.

Avoid being too general because you might leave out a crucial step in the process. On the flip side, being too detailed may cause you to lump individual tasks together or overcomplicate the steps needed to complete the job.

### **Identify Potential Hazards**

Now that you have the job broken down into individual tasks, it's time to identify all the potential hazards for each task. Get workers familiar with the job involved in this step because they already know some of the potential hazards. Remember, you are trying to identify potential hazards, not just hazards you observed or that were eliminated when you observed the worker performing the job.

For example, let's say you observed a worker cutting concrete as part of conducting a job hazard analysis. During the observation, the worker used a concrete saw equipped with a blade guard and a dust collector. The worker was wearing safety goggles and earplugs to protect his eyes and ears.

Just because the worker implemented these safety measures doesn't mean there weren't potential hazards like being struck by flying debris or exposure to silica dust and loud noises. The potential hazards were eliminated because the worker followed proper safety procedures. You can't rely on every worker to do this which is why conducting a job hazard analysis is so important.

OSHA suggests asking the following questions during your job hazard analysis to identify potential hazards:

- What can go wrong?
- What are the consequences?
- How could it arise?
- What are other contributing factors?
- How likely is it that the hazard will occur?

In addition to those questions, it's important to factor in potential hazards from working at height, hazards from using specific tools and equipment, and changes in weather conditions. Falls, electrocutions, getting struck by objects, and getting caught in or between are some of the deadliest hazards on construction sites.

### Assess the Risks of Each Hazard

After you've identified the potential hazards for each task of a job, the next step is to conduct a risk assessment of each hazard. The risk assessment of the job hazard analysis will identify the probability of the hazard occurring and the severity of possible accident injuries.

Knowing which potential hazards present the highest risks will help when determining which preventative measures should be put in place to mitigate those hazards. Higher risk hazards should take precedence over hazards that have a low chance of occurring. Conducting a risk assessment during your job hazard analysis will also come in handy for safety training purposes. A greater emphasis should be put on hazards that have a higher likelihood of occurring and causing severe injuries or death.

### Eliminate or Mitigate Hazards

Now it's time to determine what measures need to be implemented to mitigate the hazards. Your top priority should be to eliminate the hazard whenever possible. If the hazard can't be eliminated, try and contain the hazard with engineering controls like machine guards or cordoning off work areas. Other methods to mitigate hazards include revising the work procedures by modifying or adding steps or by changing the sequence of tasks. OSHA's standards and regulations for construction are a good starting point when determining which preventative measures to implement.

Reducing exposure to a hazard should be your last line of defense since it is generally regarded as the least effective method for hazard mitigation. This might include limiting the amount of time a worker is allowed to perform a specific task or using personal protective equipment (PPE) to reduce the potential for injuries should an accident occur.

Using job hazard analyses is a proven method for helping to identify and eliminate hazards on the construction site. They can be used to conduct safety training and as topics to cover when conducting safety meetings or toolbox talks. A job hazard analysis is also a useful tool in accident investigations when mishaps occur.

Each job hazard analysis should be reviewed periodically. Updates should be made when conditions or work procedures change in order to ensure that the job hazard analysis is accurate and effective in identifying and eliminating hazards.
