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For California high-speed rail to succeed, part of the Central Valley will have to wait

Since Gov. Gavin Newsom's first State of the State address six years ago, California has stopped pursuing a high-speed rail system that actually connects the Bay Area to Southern California, as was promised to voters in 2008. And in that void, politicians, pundits and a mostly partisan minority of voters howled and cried boondoggle, discounting the new focus — building only the Central Valley segment — in the same breath.

In a project update for state lawmakers released Friday, the California High-Speed Rail Authority unveiled the latest ridership and revenue projections for the Central Valley line and several other potential routes. The new data — the project's first in two years — paints a harsh picture of an unprofitable bullet train, beset by too few riders in the state's agricultural heartland, and costs for upkeep that would dwarf the money it makes unless it expands.

How Contractors Can Navigate Growth Amid Higher Costs and a Tight Labor Market

Contractors today face a number of challenges: residual effects of ongoing inflation and elevated cost of capital due to a higher interest rate environment; the impact of tariffs driving up the cost of materials; and a tight labor market making it challenging to hire skilled workers. These factors combine to make a tricky landscape for business growth. With a strategic approach, contractors can navigate unpredictable waters and position themselves for growth in the coming months and years. Here are a few key things to consider.

Tight Labor Market

Despite significant tightening from the Federal Reserve, labor markets remain incredibly tight. This means that small businesses are struggling to find quality candidates at prices that they can afford. This is especially true for part-time and seasonal employees. This labor shortage would be exacerbated by any crackdown on the hiring of undocumented labor and the large-scale deportation of undocumented individuals. It is estimated that approximately 15% of construction workers in the United States are undocumented. A significant loss of workers could limit the ability to take on new jobs, while driving up the overall cost of labor, creating a difficult environment for contractors.

For a business's most critical employees, consider offering additional perks such as flexible work hours, continuing education or opportunities for career advancement. Strong relationships and the ability to satisfy employees' career goals can help retain critical personnel in tight labor

President Trump has enacted considerable tariffs on the import of foreign goods and materials across some of America's largest trading partners. Tariffs of this scale and breadth could, over time, make manufacturing in the U.S. more economic relative to importing goods and materials from abroad. However, in the short to medium term, these tariffs are likely to raise the cost of building materials significantly. This is especially true for goods imported from Canada (lumber), Mexico (appliances) and China (iron

and steel). Contractors can expect these tariffs to both spur inflation and lower overall consumption, slowing the economy.

Contractors that import critical materials from abroad are already determining if it is possible to source these materials domestically. If domestic production would prove uneconomic, business owners will need to pay close attention to the tariffs being levied and which countries they are impacting most. Working quickly to move production from one country to another would prove valuable should certain countries receive stiffer tariffs than others with similar production capabilities.

Growth and Expansion

Contractors should be judicious in their expansion plans right now. In uncertain economic times it is important to focus on services that provide a demonstrated value to customers. Before expanding services or opening new office space, it is important to thoroughly test the market to determine demand and pricing power. Make sure that anticipated sales will more than cover anticipated expenses and be sure to have access to sufficient capital to cover several months of operating expenses in case sales take longer to materialize.

Ranking Member Markey Calls on Trump Administration to Prepare Tariff Refund Plan for Small Businesses

Ranking Member Edward J. Markey (D-Mass.) sent a letter to Small Business Administration (SBA) Administrator Kelly Loeffler, Secretary of Commerce Howard Lutnick, U.S. Trade Representative Jamieson Greer, and Chair of the Council of Economic Advisers (CEA) Stephen Miran, calling on their respective agencies to establish and publicize procedures for refunding tariffs to American businesses. During arguments before the U.S. Court of Appeals, judges expressed doubts about President Trump's claims of unlimited emergency authority to impose tariffs under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA). Millions of businesses, importers, and customers may be entitled to relief if the tariffs are invalidated.

In the letter, Ranking Member Markey writes, "Both the D.C. District Court and the U.S. Court of International Trade rejected the Administration's blatant attempt to ignore the Constitution, which gives Congress, not the president, the power to impose tariffs and regulate foreign commerce. During a subsequent hearing before



the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit at the end of July, judges expressed significant doubts about the Administration's position, which claimed unlimited power to levy tariffs in response to anything the president deems a national emergency. Petitioners made it clear that IEEPA sets the bar for emergency powers quite high: it must rise to the level of "an unusual or extraordinary threat."

Ranking Member Markey continues, "The president's own lawyers admitted in their brief before the U.S. Court of Appeals that if the Administration were to lose, businesses that have paid tariffs imposed unlawfully under IEEPA would be entitled to refunds. This would pose an incredible logistical challenge, as many tariffs are paid by third parties before being passed along to importers and their customers. Businesses would also likely be entitled to interest

on their payments, which would make these misguided tariffs even more costly for the American taxpayer.

Ranking Member Markey concludes, "If the administration fails to prepare for a situation in which hundreds of billions of dollars in tariff revenue unlawfully collected from American businesses must be repaid, it would go down as a historic act of executive malpractice, making what would already be a major, economy-wide disruption exponentially worse. Your agencies must act now so that businesses, especially our small businesses, are not left hanging should the courts overturn President Trump's destructive tariff regime."

Earlier this month, Ranking Member Markey returned to the Senate floor to pass the Small Business Liberation Act, legislation that would exempt small businesses from the broad, reckless global tariffs imposed by the Trump administration. Ranking Member Markey first attempted to pass the Small Business Liberation Act in May. Republicans blocked his legislation on the Senate floor on both occasions.

Mayor Lurie Breaks Ground on Final Phase of India Basin Waterfront Park Projectt

Mayor Daniel Lurie broke ground on a project to unite two waterfront spaces into one 10-acre park in Bayview-Hunters Point that will add a new beach, boathouse, courts, playgrounds, and more. Led by the San Francisco Recreation and Park Department, in partnership with the A. Philip Randolph Institute (APRI) San Francisco, Trust for Public Land, and the San Francisco Foundation, the project will connect the existing India Basin Shoreline Park area with the property at 900 Innes Avenue, while regrading steep slopes for accessibility and restoring the shoreline habitat.

The final phase of the park project builds on Mayor Lurie's work to promote safe and clean neighborhoods and improve public spaces. This summer, the mayor launched a public-private partnership to deliver increased neighborhood street cleaning along high-traffic commercial corridors. Earlier in his administration, he signed legislation establishing five new entertainment zones across the city and launched another in the Castro, activating public spaces and revitalizing neighborhoods.

"With this project, we are uniting waterfront land with a park that was underused, turning it into 10 acres of vibrant public space and cleaning up environmental contamination—all while

creating local jobs along the way," said Mayor Lurie. "Thank you to our partners who have invested not just in a park but also in a neighborhood's future. And thank you to the residents here: Your leadership is the reason we're breaking ground today."

The project will renovate the existing 7.5-acre India Basin Shoreline Park, built in the 1990s, to improve accessibility, restore habitats, and bring an array of new features to the community, including:

- A great lawn leading to a gravel beach
- A cookout terrace
 - A new boathouse, pier, and dock for water access

- A renovated playground for all ages with adult fitness stations
- Two basketball courts with stadium seating

For contractors who borrow money to purchase inventory, acquire equipment and fund expansion, it is important to maintain multiple financing relationships. Banks have been pulling back from lending to small businesses, and having contacts at multiple lending institutions can help secure the fastest and lowest-cost capital when borrowing is required. The equipment finance market has also been impacted by banks' reduced willingness to lend, making it more difficult for contractors to finance their equipment purchases. If contractors are having trouble obtaining financing they should:

- 1. Speak to as many potential financing sources as possible
- 2. Work with the equipment vendor to explore financing options through that vendor's financing partnerships when purchasing equipment

3. Talk to the local bank to understand their lending criteria and collateral requirements for commercial loans

If those resources don't prove fruitful, there are a number of independent non-bank lenders that are willing to lend money quickly, albeit at higher rates than a bank.

Fortunately, businesses with strong credit profiles and a history of financing essential-use equipment have quality options both with banks and non-bank lenders. However, business owners should expect a higher cost of capital than in years past and therefore should calculate the cost of the financing relative to the expected profits that the financing will generate, to ensure a positive return on investment.

Cutting Costs Through Efficiency

There is no silver bullet for cutting costs without compromising efficiency. However, contractors

looking to reduce overhead while maintaining or increasing efficiency will likely need to do so through automation. Accessing new technologies that allow businesses to operate with fewer employees and faster processes will make the business leaner and more scalable. Examples of scalable technologies being employed by businesses today include: installing software that can better manage inventory; implementing robotic processing tools to perform repetitive tasks inside warehouses or processing facilities; and deploying AI tools to allow employees to access critical information and draft standard communication faster and more accurately. These investments save time and allow the business to operate with fewer employees, reducing friction created by growth and allowing the business to operate at a lower cost base.

With ongoing inflation impacting the construction sector, it is prudent for business owners to

look for ways to lower overhead costs, capitalize on potential efficiencies and consider offerings that may be more appealing to customers in a slowing economy. Here are some final things to consider:

Inventory: Assess current inventory levels and review job needs frequently so that you aren't holding more inventory than you need to operate.

Cash flow: In uncertain economic times, it is important to pay close attention to cashflow. Contractors should ensure that they have sufficient cash on hand to weather a prolonged period of reduced sales. This means exploring improved payment terms with vendors, working with financing companies to understand what financing is available to the business, and looking closely at ways to turn fixed expenses into variable ones.

For California high-speed rail to succeed

Authority officials have previously acknowledged that the 171-mile Merced to Bakersfield line would require a subsidy to operate, a point often drowned out in the narrow debate that surrounds the project. Authority CEO Ian Choudri, now one year into the job, seems to be betting that a blunt conversation and new funding strategy — free of government aid — could convince lawmakers to endorse a new direction.

But there's a potential catch: It only might be feasible if the project is allowed to put the northernmost extension to Merced on hold.

Salvation for high-speed rail apparently lies in Gilroy, the world's garlic capital, and its potential to connect Silicon Valley to the Central Valley — or even as far south as Palmdale — by 2038. As the southern terminus for the Caltrain system, the agrarian city has long been considered high-speed rail's best chance of reaching San Francisco.

It's a bold vision worth supporting, despite the significant technical, legal, regulatory and political hurdles. Choudri, who has previously worked on high-speed rail in France and Spain, appears dead set on ending the project's reliance on fluky government grants and attracting private investors, as many foreign bullet trains have done.

"I was not coming here to just say, 'What is authorized to build?'" Choudri said in an interview. "I was here to give a scheme that works for the entire high-speed rail network—that we committed to do since the inception of this program. So I had to look at other opportunities as well."

Those opportunities could hollow out some of the promises made to the Central Valley, where local officials are planning and designing train stations, revitalizing senescent corridors and hoping a new artery to Silicon Valley can reel in lucrative new industries. High-speed rail has captured the imagination of historically neglected neighborhoods, such as southwest Fresno, inspiring support in the unlikeliest corners of California's conservative farm belt.

But retooled analyses show the Merced-Bakersfield line would generate as much as 2.2 million annual rides — just one-third of the yearly trips estimated in the last update for lawmakers two years ago. Passenger revenue similarly plummeted in the newest calculations, generating \$55.6 million each year, a far cry from the \$156 million presented in 2023.

Over a 40-year period, authority officials estimate running the Merced-Bakersfield line would result in a \$3.8 billion loss. The initial segment currently faces an \$8.6 billion funding gap to reach Merced, with costs for the Central Valley phase growing roughly \$1.8 billion from the last estimate, now totaling \$36.8 billion.

On a more promising note, the new report estimates high-speed rail could eventually be profitable for California, earning as much as \$98.1 billion over four decades. But that would require reaching existing train lines in Santa Clara and Los Angeles counties.

The most ambitious and rewarding route would cost \$87.1 billion. As for the dream of a 500-mile bullet train that marries downtown San Francisco to L.A., that appears to be off the table, at least for now.

Latest projections put Merced at risk

Statewide, a wide majority of Californians still support high-speed rail, especially among registered Democrats and independent voters. That doesn't mean construction hasn't been painful, as residents and businesses along the project's path, from Madera to Fresno to Bakersfield, will tell you.

But it's Merced that may be cast aside in the pursuit of the project's larger ambitions. As the home to the newest campus in the University of California system and the "gateway to Yosemite," Merced has been a seminal player in the high-speed rail discussion. But the authority has also lacked the funding to complete the design work, acquire the land and extend the construction beyond the 119-mile segment well underway.

The report published this week makes it clear that the only viable path is west to Gilroy and south to Palmdale, where the system can connect with Caltrain in the Bay Area and Metrolink and the High Desert Corridor in Southern California. There, the authority could try to piggyback on the enthusiasm for Brightline West, the privately funded high-speed train linking L.A. to Las Vegas later this decade.

In every scenario the authority put forward, the value of extending north to Merced was outweighed by insufficient ridership and expensive maintenance.

Of course, the California Legislature and governor would first have to authorize the change, including lifting a \$500 million spending cap on work outside the Central Valley. But the latest forecasts make it unmistakably clear what direction the project needs to go.

For Merced Mayor Matthew Serratto, to have the city pushed out of the initial segment would squander the time and effort local officials and many others have invested. Businesses in the project's path, including a grocery store, homeless shelter and more, have been forced to relocate.

"I think the majority of people are probably gonna say 'good riddance,'" Serratto said, noting the community's animus for the project. "But I think a lot of people, too, are gonna say one — especially those in government — we've been planning for this for a long time. And two, we recognize that this is potentially a major benefit to our area. So yeah, there's going to be disappointment."

The need for contagious urgency

As determined as Choudri is, he will need a lot of things to go his way.

The most urgent is convincing the Legislature to back Newsom's 15-year cap and trade extension, a long-running program that allows major polluters to pay for their emissions through a market system of auctioned credits. The market operates independent of the state's general fund, and has provided about \$1 billion each year for the project.

The governor's proposal would help highspeed rail sustain that amount until 2045, solidifying the only funding stream the project has had apart from the \$10 billion bond voters backed in 2008, and federal grants, which have been completely upended under President Trump. Unlike most transportation projects, the state has covered the vast majority of funding, accounting for almost three-quarters of the budget.

Cap and trade is key to attracting private investment, Choudri said, and represents the primary funding source for closing the Central Valley budget gap. Without it, the project is at risk of collapse.

That's not to mention the \$4 billion grant the White House clawed back this year. California has sued to force Trump to return the funds. The Republican president did the same thing over a \$1 billion grant in 2019, before the Biden administration returned the money two years later.

And that's just the funding part. In the report, the authority spells out a wishlist of regulatory exemptions, streamlined permitting and help getting outside players, such as courts, railroads, utility providers and local agencies, to move with some sense of urgency.

This is a lot to ask of a state that moves as fast as a horse and buggy when it comes to the things it needs. High-speed rail has always been a token of the self-styled ambition California boasted for generations — even as the state enacted laws and regulations that make aspirations of this scale seemingly impossible.

Choudri is not Californian, which gives him a fresh view of things. He clearly believes in the transformational power of a project that can reshape the state's economy and unlock a higher living standard for countless households.

That makes him the ideal candidate to overcome what his predecessors couldn't, or be the scapegoat if the wheels fall off.

Californians strongly support the Governor's recent historic reforms of state housing law, which will make creating more housing easier and faster. The groundbreaking reforms of the California Environmental Quality Act will accelerate new projects and increase affordability for Californians. In a recent poll, a majority of Californians across every voter category expressed agreement with the reforms.

The results show across-the-board support for the Governor's revisions to CEQA. Here's who is ready to see more projects be built now:

- All Californians: 74%
- Californians across party lines: 70% of Republicans, 81% of Democrats
- Californians across age groups: 73% of Gen Z Californians, 75% of Millennials, 73% of Gen X, and 77% of Baby Boomers
- Diverse representation of support: 71% of Asian voters, 82% of Black voters, 72% of Hispanic voters, and 76% of white voters

About the Governor's recent reforms

Earlier this summer, Governor Newsom signed historic legislation as part of the 2025-2026 state budget, enacting new laws that delivered the most consequential housing and infrastructure reform in recent state history. These transformative measures, including Assembly Bill 130 and Senate Bill 131, brought to life the bold vision set forth in the Governor's May Revision — advancing faster, more affordable housing and infrastructure as part of California's Abundance Agenda. Together, the two budget trailer bills created a comprehensive streamlining package that breaks down longstanding barriers, modern-

izes CEQA review for critical housing and infrastructure projects, and provides new tools to accelerate production and reduce costs.

Strategies that work

This builds on the Governor's broader effort to address the homelessness and housing crises impacting the entire nation and reverse a problem decades in the making. Governor Newsom is creating a structural and foundational model that will have positive impacts for generations to come by streamlining and prioritizing building of new housing, funding new shelters, housing, and supports, holding local governments accountable, removing unsanitary and dangerous encampments, and addressing mental health and its impact on homelessness through voter-approved Proposition 1, creating new pathways for those who need it most through updated conservatorship laws and a new CARE court system.

Reversing a decades-in-the-making crisis

Creating more housing is a key part of the state's strategy to address homelessness — a strategy producing positive results. Last week, the state announced reporting showing reduced homelessness in communities throughout California. Through Governor Newsom's support of local government efforts and state investments, like the funding announced today, California is reversing decades of inaction on homelessness.

Between 2014 and 2019 — before Governor Newsom took office — unsheltered homelessness in California rose by approximately 37,000 people. Since then, under this Administration, California has significantly slowed that growth, even as many other states have seen worsening trends.

The cost of sheet replacement has saved approximately \$3,000 a year, while using bulk shower amenities saved \$300 a year. The best return on their investment has been the satisfaction of the guests who appreciate their sustainable efforts.

The Pit River Greenhouse Project: Cultivating a Path to Food Sovereignty

The Pit River Tribal Council has embarked on a transformative journey toward food sovereignty. In the heart of Modoc County, California, where vast landscapes stretch between small communities and access to fresh produce remains a persistent challenge, The Pit River Greenhouse Project represents more than agricultural innovation—it embodies the tribe's commitment to nourishing their 3,700 members while revitalizing their connection to traditional foods and medicinal plants. Located in a region classified as a food desert, this initiative addresses critical nutritional needs while honoring ancestral knowledge and practices that have sustained Indigenous communities for generations.

The project is being supported through Chico-START's dedicated and comprehensive support program to their "Accelerated By" partner, Advancing Modoc Campus Center. ChicoSTART Director, Eva Shepherd-Nicoll, has made multi-

ple trips to remote Alturas, California, to provide hands-on assistance. Beginning with intensive workshops where Eva provided Entrepreneurship 101 training, Business in a Box creativity exercises, SBA program overviews, and practical AI applications. ChicoSTART is also helping by offering critical training on nonprofit formation, board responsibilities, and grant opportunities, opening doors to iHub Innovation Grants and NSF funding prospects that would have been difficult for the tribal council to access independently.

The greenhouse operation is underway with plans to leverage existing infrastructure while incorporating cutting-edge sustainable technologies, including onsite geothermal energy and forward-planning for agrovoltaics systems. They are also leveraging this site for an experimental compost study focused on converting juniper biomass into soil amendments with high humus content
