California women face persistent gender and racial barriers; it's time to work for more equity

The Delta Conveyance Project is a necessary investment to secure California's water future. Let's face it, our climate is changing rapidly and becoming more unpredictable – wildfires are larger and more frequent, the seas are rising, droughts are lasting longer and storms are fiercer. The need for this project has never been clearer

Delta conveyance is the movement of water through the network of waterways in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, the hub of the State Water Project – California's most critical water delivery infrastructure. Two-thirds of California's water begins its journey as snowmelt from high in the Sierra Nevada, eventually flowing into the Delta where the State Water Project infrastructure conveys the water to 27 million Californians and 750,000 acres of farmland from Silicon Valley down to San Diego.

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PRSRT STD U.S. Postage PAID San Fran CA 941 Permit No. 820 But the State Water Project's 1960-era infrastructure is aging and needs to be upgraded to meet the challenges ahead. As we've seen in recent years, the state's precipitation is increasingly coming in the form of big storms in-between extended dry periods. The State Water Project infrastructure must be improved to be more resilient to climate change and more flexible in its ability to take advantage of big storms by moving water when it's wet for use when it's not.

The Delta Conveyance Project would add new conveyance facilities in the Delta, including two new intakes located farther north, away from sensitive fish habitat and 20 feet above sea level. The project also includes a state-of-the-art single tunnel underneath the Delta to safely convey water from the new intakes to the existing State Water Project facilities in the south Delta.

Not only would this help ensure the continued delivery of affordable, clean water to millions of residents throughout the state, it would minimize impacts to threatened and

endangered fish species and is compatible with ecosystem restoration projects already underway.

In addition to the increased water security and environmental benefits the Delta Conveyance Project would provide, it would also help maintain California's \$5 trillion economy—the fifth largest in the world—and is particularly important for the approximately 1,500 disadvantaged communities throughout the state that rely on the State Water Project for affordable, clean water.

The proposed project is a crucial part of the governor's portfolio approach to water management and will help California water agencies develop their local water supply projects and reduce future reliance on imported supplies. That's because the consistent delivery of State Water Project water allows public water agencies to blend high-quality water with local sources to meet or exceed drinking water standards, making the most of our state's lim-

Equitable Building Electrification Means Clean Air, **Good Jobs**

As Governor Gavin Newsom publicly commits to new climate initiatives, California communities continue to grapple with the devastating impacts of COVID-19, raging wildfires, declining air quality, and an economic recession. Building electrification - if done thoughtfully and equitably – can help get us out of these converging

Four million Californians live in households that are unable to pay their rents, an estimated one in five California homeowners are behind on mortgage payments, and more than 2.5 million California workers are now jobless due to CO-VID-19.

Meanwhile, nine of the 10 largest fires in state history have burned in the past decade, and 2020 has already shattered the all-time California record for area burned: 3.6 million acres so far and growing. The costs and burdens of climate change will continue to disproportionately hurt Black, Indigenous and people of color (BIPOC) and disadvantaged communities, harming their physical health, safety and economic well-being.

California must build a new path forward to make neighborhoods sustainable, inclusive, healthy and resilient for all Californians. We call on Gov. Newsom to hear the voices of our communities, our calls for justice, and our demands for climate solutions by issuing an executive order for equitable building electrification.

Building electrification is a cornerstone of decarbonization strategies and reducing greenhouse gas emissions statewide. Gas use in buildings leads to massive emissions of methane, a highly potent and persistent greenhouse gas, along with nitrogen oxide, carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, and volatile organic compounds. These emissions accelerate climate change and also cause hazardous health conditions, both indoors and outdoors, contributing to respiratory disorders and premature death each vear. Many Californians breathe the dirtiest air in the nation. The growing share of renewables in California's electrical system makes switching from gas to electricity an effective climate strategy that can help reduce air pollution.

Environmental justice organizations and allies, along with clean energy and decarbonization advocates urge the governor to move forward ASAP with building electrification policies that address social and racial justice inequities as well as climate injustice and disasters.

Environmental Justice and Equitable Climate Action Through Building Electrification

An executive order for equitable building electrification should chart a pathway to eliminating fossil fuels from our homes and businesses that prioritizes creating cleaner and healthier environments for BIPOC, low-income, disadvantaged and other vulnerable populations. These communities face the highest risk of again being left behind in our clean energy transition and carrying the costly burden of our aging fossil fuel system. They are less able to afford electrification technologies, and as more affluent users leave the gas system, they will be stuck with the increasing cost of maintaining an oversized and unsafe gas system. These communities must be the first to receive the benefits of decarbonization. If left out of our clean energy future, they will experience even more dramatic, irreversible inequities and racial injustices.

Gas Stoves leak fossil fuels in homes

The fossil fuel industry claims we can't make clean homes affordable. They are wrong.

We call for a future where 100% of all new construction will be fossil fuel free by 2022, and that by 2030, three million buildings will be allelectric, with priority given to the homes of lowincome and disadvantaged Californians

To achieve this vision, we demand that this transition correct the historic divestment of communities and the inequitable distribution of clean energy benefits that occurred during past programs. That means placing BIPOC, low-income and disadvantaged communities up-front to ensure they receive benefits first and are not left at risk of rising costs due to the aging fossil fuel

This can be our future. Our vision of equitable building electrification calls for:

- Communities to be directly engaged in the transition away from fossil fuels. Communities can speak for themselves; they are the experts on their own experiences and needs, and are already leading on affordable, equitable clean energy policies.
- Bill savings and other benefits of removing fossil fuels from homes and communities must accrue to disadvantaged community members who have borne a disproportionate burden of the fossil fuel system's impacts. This may require additional resources to protect these communities from further injustice during this clean energy transition.
- Subsidized and unsubsidized affordable housing owners and tenants must have priority access to resources to support their transition away from fossil fuels in order to protect housing affordability and avail-
- A coordinated effort to carefully plan disinvestment in fossil fuel infrastructure in a way that does not sacrifice safety, reliability, and the ability to meet energy needs during the transition.
- Ensuring that equitable building electrification efforts include critical job training and workforce partnerships to support and improve access to high-quality, career-track jobs.

All Hands on Deck for Equitable Decarbonization

We have work to do.

We call for establishing a working group to facilitate unprecedented collaboration among state agencies, community boards, disadvantaged communities, workforce advocates, tenants' rights groups, affordable housing committees and energy program implementers. This working group will lead engagement with low-income, disadvantaged and BIPOC communities and provide strategy and implementation assistance for equitably winding down fossil fuel use and ramping up energy efficiency and clean energy.

We ask that the state review and amend existing programs and policies to support and align with the vision of Equitable Building Electrification. We also ask that the state show leadership by requiring all-electric construction by 2021 and by facilitating rapid electrification of existing buildings and schools.

We Can, So We Must: What You Can Do

Communities at the frontlines are ready for cleaner indoor and outdoor air. Parents are ready to free their children from asthma attacks and the long-term impacts of gas use in the home. Public health officials are ready to combat diseases like COVID-19 through healthy living environments. Residents and farmworkers in the Central Valley are ready to be spared fatal heat waves and unsafe working conditions. Businesses and homeowners in every part of the State are prepared to experience an autumn without wildfire trauma. But we need your leadership, governor.

The vision of equitable decarbonization we have presented is possible. It will require hard work, time and the commitment to understand the needs of our own communities better than before. We are ready to engage.

It will require the sacrifice of resources that currently feed injustice and it will demand reinvestment in communities that have endured and fought despite systematic injustice, pollution, lack of services, and lack of access to power. We are ready to be creative.

Real transformation -- that changes lives, restores our environment, and rights wrongs -comes through an underswell of immediate and persistent actions through learning and enduring together, in partnership, as allies, in community. We are ready to make the journey to a better, healthier, more equitable future.

We call on Gov. Newsom to hear the voices of impacted communities, advocates for equity, environmental justice, affordable housing, clean energy and labor, and to issue an executive Order to advance equitable building electrification as soon as possible. We can no longer wait—we stand ready to work together.

The nation's indigenous people had a population of nearly 10 million before European settlers explored America and their numbers began to fall rapidly shortly thereafter due to war and diseases brought by the settlers. Native Americans faced centuries of persecution and discrimination, losing their land and resources, and being forced onto reservations that lacked the soil and natural resources needed to build and sustain their communities.

Today, Native Americans still face threats from federal and state governments related to land-use and resource extraction. Native Americans have the highest poverty rate of any major racial group, with one in four people living below the poverty line.

Fifteen states have Native American populations of over 100,000. Additionally, 15 states have relative Native American populations below 100%

California has the highest number of Native Americans with a population of 757,628, comprising about 1.94% of its total population. This is followed by Oklahoma with 523,360 Native Americans (13.36%) and Arizona with 391,620 (5.64%)

Alaska has the highest relative population of Native Americans, who make up 19.74% of the state's total population, about 145,816 people. Oklahoma has the second-highest relative population at 13.36% of the state's total population.

Vermont has the lowest total number of Native Americans of any state with 8,169 and New Jersey has the lowest relative population of Native Americans 0.67% (59,511).

Los Angeles County in California has the highest number of Native Americans with a total of 233,000. Oglala Lakota County in South Dakota has the highest percentage of Native Americans of any county at 93.9%.

- 3. Work with a local bank. Depending on how quickly you want to scale your operations, applying for a loan with your local bank can be a great way to build community relations and find good funding options.
- 4. Seek out angel investors. If you've exhausted the previous options for finding funding, look outside your community for angel investors and other private investors in your industry. Find areas around the country where your industry is thriving, and contact business leaders in those areas.
- 5. Work with venture capitalists. This is usually the final stage in a new company's funding growth, but it isn't a necessity for all companies. 6 types of business investors

Creating an LLC in California

When launching a new business in California, you'll have to make the decision about what type of business structure you want to operate as. A sole proprietorship? California corporation? What about a California LLC?

There are benefits to each type of business entity, but in this article, we're going to look at the limited liability company and why it might be a good fit for you. We'll also talk about creating an LLC in California to help you down that path.

What is an LLC?

A limited liability company is a business entity that keeps your personal assets safe and separate from that of your company, while providing pass-through tax benefits like that of a sole proprietorship or partnership.

You can have a single member LLC or a multimember LLC, depending on whether you're the only owner or not. Which you choose will have an impact on how you file your taxes.

Your LLC will either be a foreign LLC or domestic LLC. The former means it was created in a state other than where you do business. A domestic LLC is one formed in the state where you do business.

If your business has some sort of liability to customers, such as a rental property, restaurant, or retail store, having the protection of a California LLC could be a smart idea

Benefits of a California LLC

So why choose a limited liability company over other types of business entities? First of all, if you operate as a sole proprietorship, your personal assets could be at risk. Should you ever be sued or file bankruptcy, the court can seize your personal assets if your business can't pay your debts. If you operate an LLC, those personal assets are more protected.

There's also less paperwork with the LLC versus California corporation, which has to hold shareholder meetings and make annual reports.

And creating an LLC in California has some tax benefit: they can opt for what's called "pass-through" taxation, which is a fancy way of saying the LLC doesn't pay any taxes, but the in-

come and expenses pass through to the owner's personal tax returns. This is in contrast to the double taxation that a C corporation experiences, where both the business and the owner pay income taxes.

How to Create an LLC in California

Each state has a slightly different process for setting up a limited liability company. For the California LLC, these are the steps:

- Register Your LLC with the Secretary of State
- File a Statement of Information
- Apply for an EIN
- Create an Operating Agreement
- Open a Bank Account for Your LLC
- Register with the Franchise Tax Board
- Hiring Employees? Register with the EDD
- Apply for a Seller's Permit
- Comply with County and/or City Tax Requirements

Register Your LLC with the Secretary of State

The first step to creating your California LLC is to visit the California Secretary of State website. There's an easy-to-use online filing system for your LLC. Otherwise, you can fill out your Articles of Organization (also known as Form LLC 1) and mail them in.

You will be asked the name you want your LLC to have. If it already exists, you'll be told, and you will need to pick a different name. You'll fill out your contact information and then need to select your service of process. If you're filing your California LLC paperwork yourself, you'd choose Individual. If you've hired a registered agent (more on that shortly), you'd select California Registered Corporate Agent.

Next, you'll select whether the LLC will be managed by one manager, more than one, or all LLC members. Then you'll enter the Organizer name and email (this person will get updates and information on the LLC). There is a \$70 filing fee.

File a Statement of Information

Next comes filing your Statement of Information. This is a document that contains information about your business's registered agent (if you have one) and its management or officers, as well as general contact information. You'll need to fill this out when you initially file your LLC in California, and then every two years afterward.

You can find this and other LLC documents on the Secretary of State website, or you can file your Statement of Information electronically.

Apply for an EIN

Just like you have a Social Security number, your business also needs a unique identification number, called an Employer Identification Number (EIN). You'll need this to file your taxes as well as open a business bank account.

Create an Operating Agreement

Another of the LLC documents you need is an operating agreement. This establishes the purpose of your business, who the members of the LLC are, how you will share the profits, and what, if any, tax considerations you have are.

There are templates you can use to create your LLC operating agreement online.

Open a Bank Account for Your LLC

If you're wondering why you need a separate bank account for your LLC, here are a few reasons: not only does it make it easier to file taxes, but it also can help you qualify for financing down the road. Separating your business and personal finances just makes it easier to stay organized.

You might decide to open a business checking account at the same bank you have personal accounts with. On the other hand, explore your options, because you might find one that better suits your needs elsewhere.

A side note: while you're at it, apply for one or two business credit cards so you can separate your business finances while earning credit card

Register with the Franchise Tax Board

To view LLC documents and manage your LLC online, you'll need an account with the Franchise Tax Board. Once you register, you'll need to wait to receive a PIN in the mail, which can take about a week. Once you enter the PIN, your account will be active.

Hiring Employees? Register with the EDD

If you plan to have employees, you'll need an account with the Employment Development Department. Once you do so, you can log in to

pay employment tax, print reports, or report new hires.

Apply for a Seller's Permit

If you plan to sell products, you may be required to possess a seller's permit in California. Apply for a seller's permit through the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration's online portal. Once you have your permit, you can view it, pay sales tax, or file a return online.

Comply with County and/or City Tax Requirements

In addition to the seller's permit, there may be other business licenses or permits you need, according to your city or county's regulations. Check those website to make sure you've covered all your bases.

Should You Work with a Registered Agent Service?

While California LLC formation isn't difficult, know that you also have the option for help. Registered agent services can complete the LLC filing on your behalf as well as ensure you stay compliant by paying any required annual fees or filing your Statement of Information.

You, of course, pay for these Calfornia registered agent services, but it may be worth the expense to not have to worry about the headache of maintaining your LLC status. If you operate in multiple states, having a registered agent can make sure you stay compliant with regulations in each state where you do business.

Costs of Maintaining a California LLC

Your business will need to do a few things to maintain your limited liability company status after filing. This includes paying an annual franchise tax of \$800. This state fee is due on the anniversary of your California LLC being filed.

(Just a side note: this franchise tax is due every year you operate as an LLC. If it's too steep an expense, you may be better off operating your business as a sole proprietorship.)

Additionally, you will need to file your Statement of Information every two years. There is a \$20 filing fee.

ited water resources. State Water Project water is also used to replenish groundwater basins, fill Southern California reservoirs and support recycled water projects.

California depends on the State Water Project. Without it, California would need to replace about 3 million acre-feet of high-quality water annually to meet state demand. That is enough water to serve approximately 6 million households per year.

California water agencies, policymakers and think-tanks have been studying the need for this project for more than a decade. All that work points to the same conclusion: we need a Delta conveyance solution that will reinforce State Water Project infrastructure with modern, flexible operations.

We must address what we have all known for decades: the risk of a devastating statewide water shortage is unacceptable, and time is of the essence. The Delta Conveyance Project is a game-changing modernization of California's aging water delivery infrastructure that will be paid for by the participating public water agencies that receive water from the State Water Project – not taxpayers. It will ensure we can continue to efficiently move water statewide to keep taps flowing for generations to come.

We fully support the Newsom administration as it moves forward with the Delta Conveyance Project planning process and the public water agencies who are currently considering their ongoing participation in the project. The cost of doing nothing is far too high.

is to solve urban and climatic challenges by building with nature. The use of sustainable drainage systems to mimic natural water cycles is cost-effective and can reduce the risk of flooding. Green vegetation improves the quality of air and reduces the debilitating health effects of air pollution. Blue-green infrastructure can also boost the economy due to the various recreational opportunities it provides.

4. Absorbing Labor From Areas With a High Covid-19 Impact on Employment

As stated earlier, millions of Americans, including construction workers, lost their jobs due to the pandemic. Areas with a higher rate of unemployment are places where most jobs are informal or blue collar.

Most construction workers work short-term, and appointments are terminated on completion of a project, meaning a lot of people were without jobs as the bulk of construction projects were put on hold.

The construction industry is reported to employ about 7% of the global workforce. It is largely labor-intensive. In areas of mass unemployment, local labor can be hired for construction and running logistics. The unskilled laborers can handle basic tasks with next to no training, such as supplying materials, transporting workers and machinery, and security, while the skilled workers can handle the actual building.

A lot of construction work can be assigned to workers in areas with a higher Covid-19 impact in order to create jobs for the residents, thus reducing the rate of unemployment. Ensuring that all stakeholders are aware of their legal rights is also key—revenue and income protection via filing preliminary notices in California and other states that require it is something contractors, suppliers, and subcontractors must know so as to not expose themselves in further financial risk.

Conclusion

It is important to understand that the global economy will not suddenly stabilize because workers have observed physical distancing for a week of intensive construction. Neither will a month of reliance on tech work the magic. The long-term effects of the pandemic may necessitate a restructuring of debt and need for new capital sources.

Everything that has affected and will affect the economy is a build up of calculated actions and decisions, over long periods of time. One step in the right direction is a step closer to full recovery.

How to Hire a Veteran

A 2019 report from the Bureau of Labor Statistics showed that the unemployment rate for veterans was 3.1%, which was the lowest rate in 19 years. After years of chronic unemployment, businesses seemed to have finally learned that there are great benefits to hiring veterans. The WOTC

The Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) is a Federal tax credit that aims to encourage employers to hire veterans and other traditionally disadvantaged groups of workers.

Certain qualifying hires can earn up to \$9600 per employee, and veterans are in the tier for the highest tax credit. Once you hire two, three, or more veterans, you can see how quickly this tax credit can add up.

The program currently runs until January 1st, 2021, so now is the time to hire and take advantage of the WOTC.

How to hire a veteran

Here are the steps to hire a veteran:

1. Research the skills you want from a veteran.

For any hiring decision, it's important to figure out the type of skillset you need for a position. When hiring veterans, an additional exercise is to see what traditional skills from the armed forces will best translate to the role

For example, if your company is hiring for a marketing position, the skills you may be looking for are related to crafting engaging content and understanding people's decision making process.

Plug in the position you are hiring for and see the types of military titles that result to give you a good sense of the type of veterans you might want to look for.

You can also refer to the Department of Labor's guide to hiring veterans as well.

2. Contact a local veterans employment coordinator.

Speaking of the DoL, their site can connect you with a local veterans employment coordinator to assist you in placing the right candidate. Connecting with an expert in this space can help reduce the time-to-hire, especially if you're trying to take advantage of the WOTC by the end of this year.
