

Top Commercial Construction Projects Open for Bid: August 2026

In Short:

- The major commercial construction projects up for bid in August 2026 include three megaprojects (valued at \$1 billion or more).
- The first stage of the \$22.5 billion Dulles International Airport modernization project leads the August 2026 bid list.
- Bridge reconstructions, a hospital expansion, and renovations for a historic government building complete the “top 5” projects up for bid.

Infrastructure improvements and government-backed builds are the dominating commercial construction projects up for bid in August 2026. From bridges and federal offices to a President-backed airport remodel, here are the top five projects going up for bid later this month, according to ConstructConnect® Project Intelligence.

ConstructConnect has North America’s largest commercial construction project database, tracking over 825,000 projects across the U.S.

1: Washington Dulles International – Airport Revitalization – Package A

Location: Dulles, Virginia

Project Value: \$5,000,000,000

Bid Date: Wednesday, August 19, 2026

Start Date: Tuesday, December 1, 2027

One of three megaprojects (those valued at \$1 billion or more) up for bid this month; the largest of our list may also be the most newsworthy. In late July 2026, President Donald Trump announced a \$22.5 billion renovation for Virginia’s Dulles International Airport, which serves the Washington, D.C. area.

“Package A” is the first phase of construction, which includes a proposed \$4.5 billion to \$5 billion expansion of the airport’s main terminal. Bids need to be in by August 19. Construction is scheduled to begin in December 2027, and the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority says everything must be done by 2034.

2: Columbia River Bridge Replacement - Multiple Locations

Location: Brush Prairie, Washington

Project Value: \$3,900,000,000

Bid Date: Wednesday, August 19, 2026

Start Date: Monday, October 19, 2026

From Washington, D.C. to Washington State; the second megaproject on our list takes us to the other side of the country. The Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) is seeking bidders to demolish and rebuild the bridge that carries I-5 traffic through Brush Prairie.

Californians have consistently invested in new government programs. Over the past quarter century, voters have approved tens of billions of dollars in state bonds to build schools, improve water systems, address climate risks, expand housing opportunities and strengthen public infrastructure. Those investments shape daily life across our state.

Yet years after the votes are counted and projects are underway, it can be surprisingly difficult to answer a simple question: Did we get the results we were promised?

California has long tracked how bond dollars are spent, to guard against waste and fraud. We have yet to consistently measure whether those investments achieved the outcomes voters expected.

That distinction matters. Since 2000, the state has issued \$196 billion in general obligation

bonds and now has \$81.8 billion bonds outstanding. This fiscal year alone the state will spend nearly \$8.6 billion servicing bond debt.

These investments support priorities Californians overwhelmingly value, allowing the state to finance projects that benefit generations of residents while spreading costs over time.

As these investments grow, so should our commitment to tallying their impact.

Did a bond-funded program improve wildfire resilience? How many families benefited from new housing investments, and did the investments increase affordability? Did infrastructure projects deliver the benefits promised?

These are questions investors ask. The government and voters should ask them, too.

Across the private and nonprofit sectors, measuring outcomes has become standard practice. Organizations report how much they spent and demonstrate what those investments accomplished.

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California voters have approved billions of dollars in bonds.

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Public sector spending should meet that same standard — not to assign blame, but to improve future decisions.

While California already requires agencies to report on bond expenditures, compliance is inconsistent and the reports often emphasize dollars spent rather than results achieved. That leaves legislators, taxpayers and future voters without a clear picture of what worked, what didn't and what can be improved.

As a measured next step, Assembly Bill 1754, authored by Assemblymember Blanca Pacheco, would require statewide bond measures to define

clear objectives, establish meaningful ways to measure progress, and collect data to evaluate success and publicly report — in a simple-to-read format — whether those outcomes are being achieved. Think of it as a one-page report card.

The cost of reporting would be covered through bond administration rather than the state's general fund.

It's been suggested that this new requirement may slow project funding or create unnecessary paperwork. However, defining a project's evaluation criteria would logically flow from the objectives proposed for issuing the bonds. The expected reporting is brief: a sentence or a single

number per project, part of a one or two-page summary.

Accountability and efficiency are not competing values. In fact, better outcome reporting can help policymakers identify successful investments, improve future bond programs and build stronger public confidence in how taxpayer dollars are used.

That confidence matters. California will continue asking voters to invest in schools, housing, transportation, water infrastructure and climate resilience. Those investments deserve broad public confidence.

The strongest argument for future bond measures isn't simply that California has important needs — it's that the government can demonstrate previous investments achieved meaningful results.

Evidence builds trust. Trust strengthens confidence in public institutions. And confidence makes it possible to continue investing in California's future.

Does Your PPE Conform To The Latest Standard?

Most concrete contractors already have PPE on the job. Hard hats, safety glasses, gloves, respirators, and first aid kits aren’t new to anyone in this industry.

The question isn’t whether crews have safety gear. The better question is: Does that gear conform to the most current performance standard? That’s where things can get confusing.

A product may be “compliant,” but that doesn’t always mean it reflects the latest version of a safety standard. In some cases, OSHA rules still point to older versions of ANSI/ISEA standards, even though newer versions are already being used in the field.

That gap can create problems when contractors are buying PPE, writing job specs, working with suppliers, or trying to make sure everyone on a project is following the same expectations.

Why “Compliant” Is Not Always Clear

PPE performance standards are updated over time, about every five years. Standards change because of equipment innovation, testing improvements, and advancements in understanding how injuries happen and how to prevent them.

But OSHA doesn’t always update its regulations right away. So you can end up with two different things being true at the same time: A product may meet an older standard still referenced in OSHA regs, and another product may meet a newer standard that better reflects current testing and jobsite conditions.

Both may be “compliant,” but they may not offer the same level of information, testing, or protection.

That’s why contractors should ask one more question: Does my PPE conform to the latest standard?

Head Protection

Head protection is a good example of why the version of a standard matters. OSHA still references ANSI/ISEA Z89.1 head protection stan-



dards from 1997, 2003, and 2009. But head protection has evolved substantially over the last 30 years. More recent versions of the standard include improvements related to side-impact performance, reverse donning, higher-temperature testing, and compatibility with other PPE commonly used on the job.

One important thing to understand is the difference between Type I and Type II head protection. Type I hard hats are mainly tested for impacts to the top of the head. Type II helmets are tested for impacts from more directions, including the front, back, and sides.

That matters because not every head injury comes from something falling straight down. Workers can bump into equipment, strike fixed objects, or take a hit from the side while moving around the jobsite, or during a fall

The practical takeaway: when buying or specifying head protection, don’t stop at “hard hat” or “safety helmet.” Ask which version of the standard it meets and whether it provides the level of protection needed for the work being done today.

Eye & Face Protection

Safety glasses are another area where the version matters.

OSHA still references older versions of ANSI/ISEA Z87.1 for eye and face protection. The current standard, ANSI/ISEA Z87.1-2025, uses markings that give greater detail about what the eyewear is designed to protect against.

Those markings can show whether the eyewear is rated for impact, dust, splash, or chemical exposure.

That’s useful because not all safety glasses are built for the same hazards.

A pair that may be fine for general work may not be the right choice for cutting, grinding, drilling, mixing, or cleanup. When the task changes, the eye protection may need to change with it.

The practical takeaway: make sure supervisors and crews know how to read standard markings. If workers can’t tell what their eyewear is rated for, they’re left guessing.

First Aid Kits

First aid kits are seen as easy to treat as a check-the-box item. But the standard behind the kit matters too.

OSHA guidance still points to ANSI Z308.1-1998. The current version, ANSI/ISEA Z308.1-2021, gives up-to-date guidance on what should be in workplace first aid kits, including sanitation items, supplies to help control bleeding, emergency blankets, and other items that may be needed on today’s jobsites.

An even newer version is expected later this year and will add guidance for mobile workers, the use of naloxone in the workplace, and a requirement that first aid kit guides be provided in both English and Spanish.

For contractors working across multiple jobsites, moving crews, or remote areas, these differences matter.

A small kit may be enough for some jobs. But it may not be enough for larger sites, remote pours, moving crews, or higher-risk work.
